INTRODUCING MWDSI'S NEWEST FELLOWS

e are pleased to provide you with a brief summary of the newest Midwest DSI Fellows – Dr. Gene Fliedner of Oakland University and Dr. W. "Rocky" Newman of Miami University.

Dr. Gene Fliedner

I have been an active member of Midwest DSI (MWDSI) for 20+ years. This spans the years beginning in August 1983 and continuing until August 1988 and from August 1995 to the present date. In addition to presenting papers, I have served as a session chair, track chair, and session discussant during numerous annual meetings. The following recounts some of my formal service contributions to MWDSI:

April, 2002 received the MWDSI Best Paper Award. I have also co-authored and co-proposed MWDSI Bylaw 5.3, 5.3n, and 9. In August 2004, with the approval of the MWDSI Board of Directors, I created the MWDSI website. This included applying for the domain name, creating the website and populating it with all of its current content. I have served as the webmaster for the website since that time. Dr. Newman has served Midwest Decision Sciences Institute in several capacities throughout the years. This is highlighted by his role as MWDSI President in 2003. He has also served as the Program Chair for the MWDSI annual meetings which were held on Miami's campus during both 2003 and 2009, both of which turned back substantial profits. NEW MWDSI OFFICERS NOMINATED

The following individuals were recently nominated for vacant positions on the Executive Board of Midwest DSI. The election will take place during the 2011 MWDSI Annual Meeting.

President-elect: Peter B. Southard is an Assistant Professor of Management in the Opus College of Business at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN. He grew up on a farm in central Iowa, received his Bachelor of Science degree from Iowa State University and his MBA from Drake University. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska - Lincoln where his major area was Operations and Supply Chain Management with a strong minor in Management Information Systems. Peter has taught supply chain management, operations management, Six Sigma quality, lean production and process improvement, operations planning and control systems, information systems, business strategy, and statistics for over 10 years on both the graduate and undergraduate level. He has published scholarly articles in journals such as Communications of the ACM, The International Journal of Operations and Production Management, The International Journal of Production Economics, Benchmarking: An International Journal, Management Decision, and The International Journal of Healthcare Technology and Management as well as two book chapters and several conference proceedings including the annual national meetings of the Decision Sciences Institute, Academy of Management, and HICSS. His research interests include the effects of technology innovation on supply chains with a special focus on services. His industry experience includes eight years in financial services as a senior vice president and branch manager of a private bank and six years with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in the department f.k.a. the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). His consulting experience includes work with National Research Corporation in Lincoln, NE and Regina Medical Center in Hastings, MN. Peter has served as Vice President for Member Services, Midwest Region of the Decision Sciences Institute from 2007 to present. He was also

a member of the Conference Planning Committee for the 2008 Annual Meeting of the Midwest Decision Sciences Institute. As such, he assisted Diane Parente in organizing and hosting that meeting.

Secretary: Gerald Aase is currently an Associate Professor of Operations Management at Northern Illinois University. He received bachelor degrees from the University of Minnesota in Mechanical and Agricultural Engineering and a Ph.D. in Operations Management from Indiana University. Dr. Aase's research interests involve process improvements through the use of technology. His work has appeared in the International Journal of Operations and Production Management, International Journal of Production Research, European Journal of Operations Research, and International Journal of Production Economics. Dr. Aase has been involved in the Midwest Decision Sciences Institute since his first year of the doctoral program. He has held several officer positions for MWDSI including Secretary for the past two years.

VP Planning and Development: Joseph R. Muscatello is an Assistant Professor of Business Management and Related Technology at Kent State University- Geauga. He received his Doctorate from the Cleveland State University and researches in the areas of enterprise systems, supply chain management, forecasting, project management and the impact of technology on organizations. He has published in Omega, International Journal of Operations and Production Management, Information Resource Management Journal, Applied Computing and Informatics, Journal of Business Forecasting, Journal of Safety Research, Business Technology Educator and the Business Process Management Journal. He has also published several book chapters and presented at academic and professional venues over 50 times!

Dr. Muscatello is a former Director with Cap Gemini Ernst & Young and has Fortune 500 executive level manufacturing experience in the chemical and metal industries. He is APICS certified at the Fellow level and teaches APICS (*New MWDSI Officers cont. from page 4*)

certification courses domestically and internationally. He is the owner of several businesses and sits on 2 for-profit and 2 non-profit Boards of Directors.

VP Member Services: Matthew Swinarski is an associate professor in the Sam and Irene Black School of Business at Penn State University, The Behrend College. He received his Ph.D. in MIS from the State University of New York at Buffalo. His active research areas are IS sourcing and IS education. His have papers been published/accepted in Communications of the ACM, Decision Support Systems, Communications of the AIS and Advances in Management Information Systems. and he has presented his research at numerous conferences including Americas Conference on Information Systems (AMCIS), Hawaii International Conference on System Sciences (HICSS) and Decision Sciences Institute (DSI). He has also served as Issue Managing Editor for the Journal of Information Technology Theory and Application (JITTA). STAN HARDY WINNERS ANNOUNCED

The judging of the papers for the Stan Hardy Award is complete, and the winner has been The winning paper – "Codetermined. opetition and Investment for Supply-Chain Resilience" – was co-authored by Nitin Bakshi (London Business School) and Paul Kleindorfer (INSEAD). It appeared in Production and Operations Management (Vol. 18, No. 6, pp. 583-603). The paper was selected based on its current relevance and contribution to the field of Operations Management (OM), its practicality and contribution to industry practice, and its rigor, creativity and readability. The award will officially be presented at this year's Midwest DSI Annual Meeting, on April 23rd, 2010, in Toledo, Ohio.

According to the Midwest DSI Bylaws, the President-elect convenes the Stan Hardy Award Committee to select the outstanding paper published in the OM field during the preceding year to receive the Stan Hardy Award at the annual meeting of the Midwest Region. This committee polls the editors of the following academic journals in OM and asks them to provide the top two OM articles published in their journal during the most current year: *Decision Sciences Journal, International Journal of Production Research, Journal of Operations Management, Manufacturing and Service Operations Management, and Production and Operations Management. The committee, then, evaluates these articles and selects the Stan Hardy Award winner.* I am very grateful to the editors who so generously provided their time, energy and expertise in evaluating the papers in their respective journals and nominated their two best papers. *Decision Sciences Journal* (Vicki Smith-Daniels),

- International Journal of Production Research (J. E. Middle, editor),

General: *AJB*, now in its 26th year of publication follows a double-blind review policy by two or more reviewers. The *Journal*'s goal is to provide constructive and timely feedback to authors. In the review process, the Editorial Board of the *Journal* perceives its role to be developmental rather than evaluative. The first review of manuscripts is usually completed within 12-14 weeks of submission. The manuscript acceptance rate is approximately 25 percent. The *Journal* is published twice a year.
