There were 56 respondents, consisting of 11 assistant, 21 associate, 17 full professors and

3 students. 23 of the respondents were in OM, 15 were in MIS, 12 were in Management Science or Statistics, while 6 of them were from other disciplines. (see question 8). Many of the respondents were long time members of the DSI. 26 of the 56 respondents have been member of DSI for 15 years or longer. (see question 7) 43 of the 56 respondents were from schools within the geographical area of MWDSI.

12 of the respondents indicated that they attend the MWDSI meeting every year, 10 of them indicated that they attend the meeting every two to three years, 8 indicating attendance every 4 to 7 years, while 6 respondents stated that it has been more than seven years since their last attendance. The breakdown of the last attendance at MWDSI conference can be found in the attached table for question 2.

The respondents indicated that the main reasons for attending the MWDSI meeting were:

- 1. Close proximity to my residence
- 2. Networking, meeting old friends and making new friends
- 3. Relatively inexpensive
- 4. Making a research presentation.

Since "Close proximity to my residence" and "relatively inexpensive" received a high priority among the list of many factors, I do not think it is a god idea to consider having the MWDSI meeting outside the area. As the responses to question 4 suggests, most of the respondents were not very interested in having the MWDSI meeting outside the geographical area of the region. Only 7 indicated they would attend a meeting outside the area for sure, while majority indicated either they would not be able to attend due to high cost or long distance from their current residence.

In answering question 5, the question about what could the MWDSI do to improve its services, only 14 respondents gave specific responses. The majority of these responses had to do with more practitioner involvement and more teaching, pedagogy related workshops and tutorials.

Questions 10 and 11 addressed the issues of conflicts and participation in other meetings during the approximate time of MWDSI meeting. 27 of the respondents indicated that they attended other meetings during the potential time of the MWDSI meeting. There were many competing meetings listed, the most common one being the POMS meeting. 13 of the 27 respondents indicated their attendance is or could be affected by these other meetings. Therefore we need to make sure to minimize the conflicts with other meeting times and try to make our meeting more appealing so that if there is a conflict, the member will choose the MWDSI meeting over the other conflicting meeting.
